# \$44.7B economic output

- Mining and METS employs 19.4% of region's workforce
- Bowen Basin is home to Australia's largest coal reserves which is serviced by a large METS sector in Mackay



# **AGRICULTURE & AQUACULTURE**

# \$1.9B economic output

- Diverse agricultural commodities are significant industry contributors in Queensland and Australia
- 8.2% of Queensland's fresh produce, 27.2% of sugar, 10.6% of cattle
- Aquaculture output is \$116M more than half the value of the whole Queensland sector (total \$225m)

# ROADS

Road closures and lack of investment is costing the Greater Whitsunday regional economy dearly.



Without action, road closures and stagnant investment will cost the Greater Whitsunday Region \$1.4B in Gross Regional Product; \$126.1 million in household wages and 2,146 FTE jobs over the next 10 years\* (2022).

Roads in our region are too often closed in response to an incident.

Across the region there have been an average 71.8 road closures for 140.6 days annually, including on average:

Mackay

**16.5 closures** for an average of 4.2 days



Isaac

37.3 closures

for an average of 1.4 days

# **Cyclones**

In the last 55 years, 18 recorded tropical cyclones passed within 100km of the MIW region, with five since 2010. Prolonged closures after cyclones due to poor road infrastructure hampers a community's recovery.



# **Major Rain Events**

Average January rainfall in Mackay is up to 3x higher than South East Queensland. In January 2023, there was a significant flooding event that closed 56 roads within the Whitsunday LGA for between three to four days.



#### **Road Crashes**

The Greater Whitsunday region had 12 fatal crashes by August in 2023, 6.7 times more frequent than Greater Brisbane. (Per 100,000 people)

# **IMPACT TO OUR COMMUNITIES**

The road closures cause disruptions to the everyday happenings of residents located within the Greater Whitsunday region and this creates inconvenience and frustration for residents. This negative impact has been valued as a disutility to households at \$66M annually (\$499M over 10 years in present value terms).\*

# We need the Queensland Government to:

- 1. Deliver planned projects on time
- 2. Accelerate projects in planning to construction delivery
- 3. Cost and plan projects that require investment

## 1. DELIVER PLANNED PROJECTS ON TIME

20+ road improvement projects with more than \$700M investment are committed or being constructed across the Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday LGAs. On-time delivery of these planned projects is critical to promote and support prosperity and to improve safety across our region's road network.


# To solve this crisis, the Greater Whitsunday region needs:

- Incentives to activate existing development approvals already issued by Greater Whitsunday Councils.
- Boost funding in core trunk infrastructure and critical renewal and augmentation of water, sewerage, drainage and road assets across Greater Whitsunday.
- Quarantine \$70M in funding for the Greater Whitsunday region for the swift delivery of capital investment in social and affordable housing from the Queensland Government's Housing Investment Fund and the proposed LNP policy Unlocking Homes for Queensland's Future.

# Greater Whitsunday Region remains 'tight' rental market for foreseeable future

With a Queensland Vacancy Rate: 0.9%, in regional centres: Mackay (0.6%) remained one of the tightest rental markets to break into, followed closely by Rockhampton (0.7%), Toowoomba (0.8%) and Bundaberg (0.9). Gladstone (1.2%) and Townsville (1.0%) offered renters ever-soslightly more options.

# SDA ACTIVATION

Activation of SDA precincts is critical to the long-term sustainability of the Greater Whitsunday region in a changing global economy.



The Greater Whitsunday region is home to two State Development Areas. These SDA's are strategically located to drive new and emerging industries for the Queensland economy.

## **ABBOT POINT**

## Total size: 16,885-hectares

- Located approximately 20 kilometres north-west of Bowen, in North Queensland
- Easy access to rail and roads, including the Bruce Highway
- Considerable distance from urban areas
- Suitable for large scale green energy projects; biomanufacturing; aerospace facilities and hydrogen industry development
- Other large scale heavy industrial projects requiring separation from sensitive receptors

# **RACECOURSE & ROSELLA**

Total size: 907 hectares

- Racecourse 137ha
- Rosella 770ha
- Both sites located within 10 kilometres of Mackay city
- Convenient access to employment catchments, reliable and efficient transport networks and proximity to global markets through the multi-commodity Port of Mackay and Port of Hay Point
- Racecourse: suitable for short to mediumterm opportunities for pilot commercialscale projects
- Rosella: medium to longer term development opportunities for large footprint, heavy and emerging industries

Strong investment signals from the Queensland Government is welcomed but more certainty for local government is required.

Greater Whitsunday welcomes the recent announcement of two key Regional Economic Futures Fund (REFF) projects that will support Queensland Government activities to further activate the Abbot Point and Mackay SDAs.

Mackay and Whitsunday Regional Councils require long-term State Government investment commitment towards local councils to underpin core trunk infrastructure and critical renewal and augmentation of water, sewerage, drainage and road assets.

# Finch Hatton Mountain Bike Trail — Stage 2

Stage 2 of the project involves the construction of 82km of trails, including a 40km wilderness trail from Eungella to Finch Hatton.

Stage 1 of the Trail opened in April 2024, with thousands of local, national and international visitors enjoying the world-class destination.

This project is of state and national significance. Council is asking the Queensland Government to list it as a priority project.

# **Regional Impact**

Conservative analysis indicates that there is potential to attract 31,000 visitors annually to the region for mountain biking generating an additional \$18 million annual economic benefit and 110 FTE jobs in the Mackay region.

#### **Project Status**

Stage 2 planning and investigation works underway, construction likely to commence mid-2026.

# Whitsunday Coast Airport Masterplan

The 2024 Master Plan provides a staged development approach to long-term growth and highlights priority development to address critical areas of concern.

The regional tourism sector is in a phase of prolonged growth and tourism visitation is up 8.7% over three years and expenditure has increased by 17.8% over the same period. A modern airport is vital to the continuing development of the Whitsundays tourism brand.

# Nebo Showgrounds — Stage 2

This critical piece of community infrastructure supports industry, rural sporting pursuits, community groups and major events.

Nebo Showgrounds is home to Australia's biggest one-day rodeo attracting 5,000 people from across regional Australia.

Stage 2 will deliver upgraded camping facilities, undercover and outdoor arena development, a new multi-purpose pavilion and interpretative story telling and walking trail.

### **Regional Impact**

The Nebo Showgrounds Master Plan is about ensuring a critical piece of community and industry infrastructure is future proofed.

# Resources Centre of Excellence — Stage 2

Stage 2 will complete and fit out the third pod in the Future Industries Hub to incubate new and emerging industry including biomanufacturing; critical minerals and more.

The Future Industries Hub is modelled on the highly successful Resources Centre of Excellence and will provide a common user facility to support proponents to research, test and innovate in region, and act as a launching platform for commercial scale development.



To maximise State Development activation, the Greater Whitsunday region is seeking investment for detailed analysis of all feedstocks (including industrial waste) for future biomanufacturing investment attraction and operations.

The Greater Whitsunday's abundant feedstocks, favourable tropical climate, efficient mature and modern agricultural industry, strong manufacturing base, world-class expertise in research and development, proximity to employment catchments, reliable and efficient transport networks and proximity to global markets through the multi-commodity Port of Mackay and Port of Hay Point makes it the ideal home to the emerging biomanufacturing industry. Detailed feedstock analysis is required to support the growth of this ambition.
